

ERSKINE BOWLES - BIOGRAPHY

Erskine Bowles has served as president of the multi-campus University of North Carolina since January 1, 2006. Born and raised in Greensboro, N.C., he is a graduate of the University North Carolina at Chapel Hill (1967) and Columbia University's Graduate School of Business (1969). He holds eight honorary doctorates from universities and colleges throughout America.

Bowles began his business career at Morgan Stanley & Co. in New York as an associate in the corporate finance group. In that position, he saw the unfilled opportunity to provide corporate finance expertise to America's middle-market companies. He soon returned home to North Carolina, where he founded and served as chairman and CEO of the Charlotte-based investment banking firm that became Bowles Hollowell Connor & Co. Bowles also was a founder of Kitty Hawk Capital, a venture capital company, and Carousel Capital, a middle-market private equity company.

In 1993, Bowles was appointed by President Bill Clinton to serve as director of the Small Business Administration, and later was tapped to serve as deputy White House chief of staff (1994-95) and White House chief of staff (1996-98). As chief of staff, he helped negotiate the first balanced budget in a generation. As a member of the National Economic Council and National Security Council, he helped guide domestic and foreign policy. In prior service as deputy White House chief of staff, Bowles helped direct the government's response to the Oklahoma City bombing in 1995. After he left the White House, he also served from 1999 to 2001 as a general partner of Forstmann Little, a New York-based private equity firm. He ran for the U.S. Senate in 2002 and 2004, and currently serves on the boards of Morgan Stanley and Cousins Properties.

Bowles has shown a life-long commitment to public service in North Carolina and beyond. He helped found Dogwood Equity, chaired the Rural Prosperity Task Force, and served as a trustee of the Golden LEAF Foundation—three entities designed to bring economic development to rural North Carolina. Bowles also has served as vice chair of Carolinas Medical Center in Charlotte and as a trustee of the Duke Endowment. Family illness inspired Bowles to help lead efforts to create an ALS (Lou Gehrigs Disease) Center in Charlotte and to serve as the international president of the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. In 2005, he was appointed United Nations deputy special envoy to 13 tsunami-affected countries in Southeast Asia.

Bowles has been married since 1971 to Crandall Close Bowles, retired chief executive officer of Springs Industries, one of the nation's largest textile companies. They have three adult children: Sam, Annie, and Bill.

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LINDA P. BRADY - BIOGRAPHY

Dr. Linda P. Brady joined The University of North Carolina at Greensboro as its 10th Chancellor on August 1, 2008. She came from the University of Oregon's flagship campus at Eugene, where she was previously senior vice president and provost.

A native of New York City and the first member of her family to attend college, Brady graduated from Douglass College, the women's division of Rutgers University, in 1969 with a degree in political science. She received a master's degree in the field from Rutgers University (1970) and a doctorate in political science from The Ohio State University (1974). She began her academic career as an assistant professor of political science at Vanderbilt University in 1973 and joined the faculty at Goucher College in Maryland three years later.

From 1978 to 1985, Brady held several positions in the U.S. Department of State and the U.S. Department of Defense. Among those roles, she served as a political analyst in the State Department's Office of Disarmament and Arms Control and as special assistant for mutual and balanced force reductions in the Office of the Secretary of Defense. She later served as a senior fellow in international security and arms control at the Carter Center of Emory University (1986-87) and as a distinguished professor of national security at the U.S. Military Academy (1991-92).

From 1993 to 2001, Brady led the Sam Nunn School of International Affairs at the Georgia Institute of Technology, where she was also a professor of international affairs. She joined North Carolina State University in 2001 as Dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences and professor of political science, and over the next five years was credited with building the stature and visibility of the College, launching a number of new graduate degree programs, and significantly increasing external support for the humanities and social sciences at NC State. She left North Carolina in 2006 to become the chief academic and operating officer at the University of Oregon.

Brady has authored or co-edited three books and numerous book chapters and scholarly articles in the fields of American foreign policy, international negotiation, and arms control. Among other professional organizations, she is a member of the International Studies Association, the American Political Science Association, the International Institute for Strategic Studies, and the Council on Foreign Relations.

A past recipient of the Georgia Tech School of Social Sciences Teaching Award, she has earned the Superior Honor Award from the U.S. Department of State and is a two-time recipient of the Outstanding Civilian Service Medal from the Department of the Army. She was an American Council on Education Fellow in 1997-98, serving her fellowship year at the University of Iowa under the mentorship of President Mary Sue Coleman.

Since arriving in Greensboro, Brady has been an active participant in Action Greensboro, The Greensboro Partnership and the Greensboro Rotary. She serves on The Board of Directors of the United Way of Greater Greensboro and is a member of the United Way Campaign Cabinet.

Brady is married to Gustav "Steve" Heyer, a retired Army officer. She has two adult stepsons and three grandchildren: Stephen Heyer and his wife, Suzanne, live in Richmond, VA, with their children Alex, Megan, and Andrew Casey, while Michael Heyer lives in Chicago, IL.

HANNAH D. GAGE - BIOGRAPHY

Hannah Dawson Gage, the first woman to Chair the University of North Carolina Board of Governors, was elected Chair in June 2008. She was first appointed to the Board in 2001 by the North Carolina Senate and began her third four-year term in 2009. Gage has served as Chair of the Budget and Finance Committee, the Personnel and Tenure Committee and served as Co-Chair of the Tuition Task Force.

Prior to joining the Board of Governors, Gage served for eight years as a board member and as Chair of the University of North Carolina at Wilmington Board of Trustees. She was a leader in UNC-W's successful effort to establish a world-class marine science center.

Gage is a 1975 graduate of UNC-Chapel Hill's School of Journalism. Following graduation, she began a career in communications, working for radio, television and newspaper before moving to Wilmington in 1981, where she began her career in radio management. Gage broke new ground in southeastern North Carolina when she started the first FM Contemporary radio station to target female listeners. She also established the first News Talk Radio station in southeastern North Carolina followed by the first FM radio station to target the African American listener.

In 1992 Gage was awarded the American Advertising Federation's Silver Medal for her contribution to the advertising and marketing industry. In June of 2009, she was inducted into the North Carolina Association of Broadcaster's Hall of Fame. Following the sale of Cape Fear Broadcasting and Cape Fear Radio in 2001, Gage retired from radio.

Gage is married to William Frank Gage, a registered architect in Wilmington, and they have two sons, Dawson 21, and Stedman 18. Both are students at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

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JOE HACKNEY - BIOGRAPHY

Joe Hackney was elected speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives in January 2007 at the start of his 14th term in office. During his tenure, Speaker Hackney has been one of the General Assembly's leading advocates for openness in government and ethics and lobbying reforms.

Prior to becoming Speaker, Hackney was House Democratic Leader for one term, House Majority Leader for one term and Speaker Pro Tempore for two terms. As House Leader, he helped win back the majority in 2004 and expand this majority in 2006. No Democratic seats were lost during his leadership of the caucus.

Speaker Hackney began his legal career as a clerk for North Carolina Supreme Court Associate Justice Frank Huskins. He worked as an assistant district attorney in Orange and Chatham counties from 1971-74 before entering politics as the campaign manager for North Carolina Congressman Ike Andrews.

Since 1974, Speaker Hackney has been a partner in the Epting & Hackney law firm in Chapel Hill, N.C. In addition, he and his brother continue to operate the family cattle farm in Chatham County where they grew up.

Hackney received a bachelor's degree in political science and a juris doctorate degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He and his wife, Betsy, have two adult sons, Dan and Will.

Speaker Hackney is the immediate past president of the National Conference of State Legislatures. In 2007, he received the group's Excellence in State Legislative Leadership Award, the nation's top honor for state legislators.

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J. EDWARD KITCHEN - BIOGRAPHY

J. Edward (Ed) Kitchen currently serves as Vice President of the Joseph M. Bryan Foundation and Chairman of the Board of Directors for Gateway University Research Park, a joint collaboration between The University of North Carolina at Greensboro and North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University.

For a decade, Kitchen served as Personnel Director for the City of Greensboro, North Carolina; then as Assistant City Manager and Deputy City Manager. In 1995, he was appointed City Manager of Greensboro and served in that capacity from 1995 to 2005.

As City Manager, Kitchen led major investments in the water and sewer system resulting in:

- Adequate water supply for Greensboro area for the next 35+ years
- Adequate sewer capacity to service growth for next 15+ years
- Initiated major change to water and sewer service boundary policies including opening large areas east of the city for development.

Among his other accomplishments as City Manager, he conservatively managed the city budget and finances, maintaining AAA Bond Rating and Stable Property Tax Rate; negotiated a 30-year annexation boundary agreement with the City of Burlington; and led staff efforts in support of a citizens committee to develop Greensboro's first Comprehensive Plan for Growth Management.

His civic and professional affiliations include: International City/County Management Association; North Carolina City/County Management Association; Greensboro Economic Development Partnership; Greensboro Rotary; Greensboro Sport Council; United Way Campaign Vice-Chair; Leadership Greensboro Graduate; Civil Rights Museum Campaign Committee; and Greensboro Center for Innovative Development Advisory Board.

Kitchen received his undergraduate degree in Political Science from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1971; and his Master of Public Administration from UNC-Chapel Hill in 1979.

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HAROLD L. MARTIN, SR. - BIOGRAPHY

Dr. Harold L. Martin, Sr. was elected the twelfth Chancellor of North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University and assumed his position on June 8, 2009. As the Chancellor, Dr. Martin serves as the chief executive and administrative head of the university, exercising overall authority, subject to the direction of the Board of Trustees and the President of the University of North Carolina. The University of North Carolina is a seventeen-campus system, including the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, governed by the UNC Board of Governors. Dr. Martin's responsibilities include setting a strategic direction for the institution, maintaining fiscal integrity, broadly marketing the institution, building strong and lasting relationships with institutional constituents-business and community leaders, alumni, and friends, and raising funds to meet the needs of the institution.

Dr. Martin became the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs at the University of North Carolina in July of 2006. As the Senior Vice President, he led the development and implementation of the academic mission of the University, including teaching, research, international programs and student affairs. He advised the President and provided leadership for the President's council. Dr. Martin advised the Board of Governors on academic affairs issues of university-wide importance; led strategic academic planning and the implementation of resulting policies affecting the system; worked closely with campus chancellors and chief academic officers on university-wide academic initiatives; worked to maintain the focus of the missions of the campuses, and implemented the academic portion of the Long-Range Plan. He led the University's research and educational missions and oversaw Academic Planning; Faculty Support and International Programs; Academic and Student Affairs; Sponsored Programs and Research; Strategy Development and Analysis; and the North Carolina State Education Assistance Authority, units which comprise the *Division of Academic Affairs*.

Prior to joining UNC General Administration, Dr. Martin was the eleventh chief administrator and the seventh chancellor of Winston-Salem State University from January 2000 to July 2006. While at WSSU, he guided the reclassification of WSSU from a baccalaureate I to a master's II institution, created a School of Graduate Studies and Research, established seven master's degree programs and enhanced the quality of overall academic programs. While at WSSU, the university's enrollment doubled since 2000, giving WSSU the fastest growing enrollment in the University of North Carolina system.

Dr. Martin served as a strong community leader while at WSSU and participated in several local citizen initiatives, including, Biotechnology in the Piedmont Triad, the ECHO Council, Leadership Winston-Salem, the Piedmont Triad Partnership, the Triad Entrepreneurial Initiative, The Winston-Salem Millennium Fund, Winston-Salem Alliance, and the Winston-Salem Rotary Club. He serves on the boards of the Research Triangle Institute, UNC Press, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of North Carolina, the Southern Education Foundation, TUCASI, UNC-TV Foundation, and the Winston-Salem Foundation; and serves on the SACS Commission on Colleges. Dr. Martin has written and co-authored numerous articles and has made many presentations at national and international conferences. He has served as a consultant to major corporations and companies and is a member of Tau Beta Pi, the National Engineering Honor Society, Eta Kappa Nu, and the International Honor Society for Electrical Engineers, and Beta Gamma Sigma, the International Honor Society for Business.

His earlier positions include vice chancellor of academic affairs at N.C. A&T State University (1994-99), and dean of the college of engineering (1989-94.) He was chair (1985-87) and acting chair (1984-85) of electrical engineering at A&T. Dr. Martin holds bachelors and masters of science degrees in electrical engineering from A&T and a Ph.D. in electrical engineering from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

He is married to the former Davida Wagner, and they have two sons, Harold Jr. and Walter. Davida is the county attorney for Forsyth County; Harold Jr. is a graduate of Morehouse College, Harvard Business School, and Yale Law School and currently works for McKinsey & Company; and Walter, a graduate of Hampton University, attends the University of Maryland Dental School.
